Der Workshop im zeitgenössischen Tanz – Ein Entschreiben des Körpers?

Der zeitgenössische Tanz setzt sich selbst das ziellose Ziel, sich immer wieder neu zu entschreiben in einem sprachlichen und körperlichen Tanz auf der Grenze des Möglichen. Erst in seiner Aktualisierung wagt er, sich selbst für einen kurzen Moment vorzuschreiben, was er ist, und zeigt damit möglicherweise auch immer ein kleines bisschen von dem, was er war und deutet an, was er sein könnte. Wie könnte dieses Entschreiben des Körpers aussehen und welche Besonderheit weist das Workshop-Format auf, um dies zu ermöglichen?

De(s)colonial and Photographic approach to the Search for Contact Zones between the Periphery and Center in mumok's Collection and Exhibitions, 1998–2018

My contribution focuses on a de(s)colonial and photographic approach to the analysis of mumok's collection and exhibition program between 1998 and 2018, a decade on either side of the 2008 global economic collapse (Brown 2015, Temin 2010). In this period Museum moderner Kunst Stiftung Ludwig Wien - mumok acquired the work of two female artists from Latin America who use photography as their expressive medium (mumok 2018, 2019). This presentation frames their presence within the field theory (Araeen, Quemin, Bourdieu) from a gender critical perspective.

Actor-Network Theatre: Queer Life & Constructions of Artefacts

The presentation introduces a selection of the most intriguing parts of the PhD project under consideration. The first part is dedicated to the conceptual framework called 'Action-Network Theatre' in relation to its origins and the scope of applicability. The second part showcases the three main case studies of the PhD project, discussing how the proposed framework is used to examine the emergence of: an artist-run art space, a series of performative artworks, and a local theoretical discourse forming around the contemporary art scene in Kazakhstan.

Mestizaje, Neoliberalism, and the Persistence of "Whiteness" in Mexico

by Mariel Rodríguez, Doctor of Philosophy program PhD Supervisor: Ruth Sonderegger | Presentation in English

This paper examines the evolving role of mestizaje in Mexico under neoliberal globalization. Once central to nation-building, state-led mestizaje discourses have been supplanted by market-driven identity formations and multiculturalist indigenism. Yet, mestizaje persists in culture and public memory, reinforcing privilege through racialized whiteness (blanquitud) —as a habitus required for participation in Modernity. Drawing on Bolívar Echeverría, this study argues that mestizaje remains a subtle mechanism of exclusion, sustaining racial hierarchies while obscuring them.

Racial Enclosures in the Anti-State State. Racial Capitalism, Migration and Securitization.

In the paper I will focus on the final part of the dissertation, exploring the contradictory dynamics of global neoliberalism, racial enclosures as mechanisms of material and ideological exclusion, and the idea of the anti-state as a form of implementation of the neoliberal project.

Mapping Otherness: Spirituality, Subjectivation, and Subtle Forms of Resistance in Postcolonial Contexts

This project explores spirituality as subtle resistance, critiquing Western-centric activism and subjectivation processes. Examining Iran's 1979 revolution through Michel Foucault, Daryush Shayegan, and Ranajit Guha, this project highlights spiritual activism, cultural schizophrenia, and subaltern agency, proposing a global framework to rethink non-Western identity beyond Eurocentric narratives.

From the Shoebox to the Archive – A reflexion on the production of photographs in the 1974-1989 inter-revolutionary space between the Carnation and the Velvet Revolutions

by Ana de Almeida, Doctor of Philosophy program PhD Supervisor: Sabeth Buchmann | Presentation in English

This dissertation accompanies the transformation of a collection of photos stored inside a shoebox into an archive where lived and transmitted experience is articulated with macro-political and historical processes. It has as its main source the amateur photos of José Alberto Vidal de Almeida, my father, a Portuguese scholarship holder student in the former Czechoslovakia between 1978 and 1987. The analysis of the archive allows a parallel following of the final years of the communist regime in Czechoslovakia and the first years after the left wing revolution in Portugal, in April 1974.

Claudia Sandoval Romero

claudia* sandoval romero is an Austro-Colombian journalist, researcher and transdisciplinary artist. At the heart of sandoval romero's proposal is a critical reflection on archives and counter- archives, care work and the pursuit of epistemological justice within the contact zones. sandoval romero's work engages deeply with feminisms (*), horizontal pedagogies and practices of deScoloniality, driven by a commitment to expose power relations and open up spaces for erased voices to be heard. This approach to art is nurtured by the driving force of creating pedagogical spaces of horizontal exchange, contributing to the urgent debates around loss, mourning and restitution for women and non-binary people (*) of the Global South—voices systematically erased from the symbolic, economic and social fields. sandoval romero's practice spans photography, film/video and research, fusing sociological methods with collective creation. claudia* sandoval romero holds a Bachelor in Media and Journalism (University of Valle, Colombia), a Master in New Media Art (University of Sao Paulo, Brazil) and a Master in Critical Studies (Academy of Fine Arts Vienna). sandoval romero is currently pursuing her* PhD in the sociology of art, supported by the DOC Scholarship of the Austrian Academy of Sciences (ÖAW) until December 2024 and the Dissertation Completion Fellowship from January to June 2025.

Ruthia Jenrbekova is an artist and researcher from Almaty, Kazakhstan. She holds MA in ecology and works as an intermedial cultural organizer. Co-founder of Kreolex zentre. Fields of interest: queer ecology, material semiotics, arts-based methodologies, transfeminism.

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Ana de Almeida

Ana de Almeida is an artist and researcher living and working in Lisbon and Vienna. In her practice, de Almeida deals with individual and collective memory and processes of remembering from a socio-political perspective, with the intersection of family-narratives and macro-political events and with processes of privatization of history. She is a Doc-Team fellow of the Austrian Academy of Sciences, researcher at the Institute of Art Theory and Cultural Studies of the Academy of Fine Arts Vienna and lecturer at the University for Applied Arts Vienna.
